We are excited to be ministering in a new way. For more than 20 years, we have traveled extensively - - preaching at

Now, God has opened a door for us to work more closely with a few struggling congregations in the state of Tarija. While some might view this as a shift in focus, we see it as a wonderful opportunity to reach the community directly and become more deeply involved in the lives of those attending these churches, it is challenging yet incredibly rewarding to see God working up close and personal. Our first partnership is with congregation in Tarija city.

write from Bolivia

As we send this, Bolivia is facing severe political upheaval. A protest movement that many believe is financed by drug traffickers is seeking to overthrow President Rodrigo Paz only six months into his term. We had hoped his election heralded a return to democracy, and an end to corruption and lawlessness. Please pray that the good and decent citizens of

Bolivia be protected from violence and that a just resolution to this conflict will come about soon.



From Uganda the **Stevensons** share: we are launching an Ebola relief initiative that will support our sponsored families in Goma, DRC, as well as vulnerable families in the Kyangwali Refugee Settlement, one of Uganda's largest refugee communities hosting Congolese refugees. The project will focus on promoting health and safety through the provision of essential supplies, food assistance, hygiene support, and community education.

We are especially thankful for the partnership of Kinderhilfswerk Global Care, which is joining us in this effort to help strengthen security, improve access to food, and encourage healthy sanitation

and cleanliness practices among vulnerable families.

As the situation continues to stabilise, we ask for your continued prayers for protection, wisdom, and peace for those affected, as well as for the health workers, community leaders, and organizations serving on the front lines. We are thankful the numbers are staying in the lower digits, and this is due to the cautious approach the government has taken in dealing with large events and border crossings. The women of the Church of God in Uganda celebrated their National Women's Day on the first Sunday in May, amidst the breathtaking mountains of Mbale. This year's celebration was especially meaningful as it coincided with the official opening of the new sewing center in Buwangwa and the visit of our ministry team from the United States and Germany.
